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WAYS TO PREVENT A WORKPLACE FIRE:

Fire safety is everyone's responsibility. We all need to be alert to anything that could cause a fire, and take responsibility to report any problem areas so they can be corrected. Here are some simple but important ways to help prevent fires:

- **Keep it clean**: Good housekeeping matters. Clutter can fuel fires and block emergency exits or emergency equipment.
- Use hot work permits: Always complete them properly, remove flammable materials and follow safe work procedures.
- Dispose of oily rags safely: Use designated oily rag bins and empty them daily.
- Maintain equipment: Regularly service machinery to prevent overheating or sparks from friction.
- Report electrical issues: Faulty wiring and malfunctioning equipment are major fire risks. Never attempt repairs unless you're qualified and authorized.
- **Keep electrical panels clear:** Don't store anything in front of them—quick access is critical in an emergency.
- Be cautious in explosive environments: Use non-sparking tools and control static electricity when working around flammable vapours or combustible dust.
- Smoke safely: Only smoke in designated areas and fully extinguish materials. Never smoke near storerooms or chemical storage.
- Don't block safety systems: Keep sprinklers, fire extinguishers and emergency exits clear. Follow stacking clearance rules.

WHAT TO DO IN CASE OF A FIRE:

It's important to know exactly what to do if a fire breaks out. Being prepared can save lives.

- Know the plan: Understand your company's emergency procedures and your role during an evacuation.
- Sound the alarm: If you see a fire, pull the fire alarm immediately to alert others.
- Evacuate safely: Head to the designated muster point outside the building.
- Use extinguishers only if trained: If you're trained and it's safe, you may attempt to put out a small fire using the correct type of extinguisher. Always keep a clear escape route. If the fire isn't out after one extinguisher, evacuate immediately.
- Shut down equipment: If it's safe and part of your emergency plan, turn off machinery or process equipment as you leave.
- Take drills seriously: Fire drills are practice for the real thing—they help save lives and protect property.

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
