

## **Recent Serious Incidents**

Date: August 2025

**Details:** WorkSafeBC regularly publishes summaries of recent work-related incidents based on preliminary information.

While these details may be subject to change as investigations progress, sharing them can help raise awareness and prevent similar injuries.

The latest bulletin includes the following 4 incidents related to harvesting operations:

**Injury Type:** Multiple injuries

Core Activity: Manual tree falling and bucking / Helicopter logging

Location: Vancouver Island/Coastal B.C.

**Date of Incident:** 2025-Jul **ID Number:** 2025214400001

A worker was preparing to buck a log when another log, which had previously been

assessed, rolled from above and struck them.

Injury Type: Fatal (1 worker)

**Core Activity:** Cable or hi-lead logging **Location:** Vancouver Island/Coastal B.C.

Date of Incident: 2025-Jul ID Number: 2025161750004

A worker was standing on a deck of logs, speaking to a log loader operator, when four of the logs rolled, striking and pinning the worker to the track of the log loader. The worker

sustained fatal injuries.





## **INDUSTRY SAFETY ALERT**

Injury Type: Injuries to head

**Core Activity:** Integrated forest management **Location:** Vancouver Island/Coastal B.C.

**Date of Incident:** 2025-Jun **ID Number:** 2025161740021

A worker was changing a bushing on a leaf spring of a service truck. The worker used a chisel to keep the eyelet of the leaf spring open. The chisel ejected from the spring and struck the worker, breaking their safety glasses.

Injury Type: Fracture (1 worker)

**Core Activity:** Manual tree falling and bucking **Location:** Vancouver Island/Coastal B.C.

**Date of Incident:** 2025-May **ID Number:** 2025194910007

A worker was assisting their falling partner, who was dealing with a 36-inch-diameter cedar tree. The first worker was about 20 feet back from the stump when they were struck by a 6-foot section of a slab that broke off from the cedar tree during the falling process.
