TIPS FOR DRIVERS:

- Slow Down and Stay Alert: Watch your speed especially in residential areas where kids are out trick-or-treating. Driving at a safe speed gives you more time to react if a child suddenly steps into the road. For example, a vehicle traveling at 30 km/h needs about 18 meters (roughly the length of four cars) to come to a complete stop.
- Keep Your Eyes on the Road, Not Your Phone: Distracted driving is a leading cause of pedestrian accidents. On Halloween, when people are everywhere, it's especially important to stay focused. Put your phone away and keep your attention on the road.
- Be Patient and Cautious: Expect slower traffic as other drivers watch for trick-or-treaters. If a vehicle ahead is slowing down or stopped, don't try to pass—it may be allowing children to cross the street.

TIPS FOR TRICK OR TREATERS:

- Stick Together: Before heading out, set up a buddy system to make sure no one walks alone. Staying in groups helps keep everyone safe and makes the night more fun.
- Follow Traffic Rules: Always obey road signs and signals. Be alert and aware of your surroundings, especially near busy streets.
- Cross Safely: Use crosswalks or intersections whenever possible. Look both ways—and check for turning vehicles—before crossing. Make eye contact with drivers to ensure they see you.

TIPS FOR CELEBRATIONS:

- Plan Ahead for a Safe Ride: If you're planning to drink, arrange a safe way to get home before the festivities begin. Choose a designated driver or book a ride through a taxi, ride-hailing, or ride-sharing service.
- Don't Drive After Drinking—Ever: Even small amounts of alcohol can impair your ability to drive safely. If you've been drinking, find another way home. It's never worth the risk.
- Use Fireworks Responsibly: In areas where fireworks are permitted, make sure to light them in a clear, open space away from roads and traffic. Avoid setting them off near pedestrians or vehicles—especially on Halloween night when visibility is low and foot traffic is high.

REMEMBER:

A little extra caution goes a long way in making Halloween a safe, memorable and enjoyable experience for everyone.
